



Amy Phuong, Commissioner of Parks and Recreation for the City of Atlanta, is one of Mayor Kasim Reed's youngest Cabinet members, joining the Administration in 2010. Prior to her appointment, Amy served as Chief Service Officer for the City of Atlanta. For more than a decade, Amy has served as a leader of numerous civic and philanthropic organizations dedicated to improving Atlanta. She has deep relationships with Atlanta's arts, culture, civic and academic communities. Amy formerly worked as an Operations Manager at McMaster-Carr Supply Company, a supplier of over 480,000 products to industrial and commercial facilities. As a double-graduate of Georgia Tech, Amy received her Masters in Business Administration, with a concentration in Technology, and Bachelors of Science in International Affairs, with Honors, and a Minor in Economics. She also served as Student Body President in her senior undergraduate year.

Her current community volunteer activities include board positions with Dad's Garage Theatre, The Children's Museum of Atlanta, FLUX Projects, The Leadership Council for Woodruff Arts Center's Arts for Learning, and Outstanding Atlanta (trustee). She is also a Partner of the Truman National Security Project and serves on the Georgia Statewide Afterschool Network Leadership Council. Previously, she has served on the Red Clay Democrats Board of Governors, the Southeastern Regional Advisory Board of the National Church Residences, the Quality of Life Advisory Committee for the Fort McPherson Redevelopment Project, Keep Atlanta Beautiful Board, The United Way of Metropolitan Atlanta's Cole Society Advisory Board, The Youth Channel Board (President), the Campaign for Atlanta, and the Georgia Teen Institute Youth Advisory Group.
