# Trolley Trail Master Plan

## An Incredible Opportunity

Converting the historic Atlanta-Decatur Trolley is a rare opportunity to connect the Trolley Trail linear park and PATH trail to the Reynoldstown, Egdewood and Kirkwood communities. Coupled with the trail planned from Kirkwood to Decatur on the same trolley line, East Lake, Oakhurst and Decatur will also enjoy the connectivity.

The trail and accompanying greenspaces will offer the eastside communities a safe and convenient way to access the Atlanta BeltLine Trail and neighboring amenities.

This 1.3 mile-long project will cost approximately \$3 million to complete and could be constructed in 2017 and 2018.

The eastside neighborhoods need a safe, direct, and enjoyable way to walk and bike. The proposed Trolley Trail can be built largely using existing city right-of-way and without significant tree loss. Repurposing a portion of the existing street and trolley right-of-way into a separated venue for walkers and bicyclists will dramatically improve the health and happiness of all adjacent neighborhoods. The Trolley Trail presents a significant opportunity for connectivity and is a priority to construct. The PATH Foundation and the City of Atlanta are forming a partnership to work with the adjacent community members to implement.
