The 2020 Annual Action Plan, or AAP, will be the first yearly plan under the City's 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan. The AAP will include the projects to be funded in program year 2020 under the 4 entitlement grants. Projects are recommended in accordance with the priorities of the Consolidated Plan.

The HOME grant is dedicated to affordable housing. ESG is dedicated to homeless assistance and homeless prevention. HOPWA is dedicated to housing and related services for persons with HIV/AIDS. Only the CDBG program has the flexibility to address, to some extent, services and needs beyond the three primary focus areas. Portions of the Plan cover community development needs such as public works and economic development.

The current funding recommendation complies with the overriding principle of benefiting low and moderate-income persons and households. HOME, ESG, and HOPWA are restricted to activities that benefit low and moderate-income persons; at least 70% of CDBG funding must be used for activities that benefit low and moderate-income persons.

CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds are to be used for the benefit of persons living in the City of Atlanta. The HOPWA grant covers a 29-county Eligible Metropolitan Statistical Area or EMSA, and Atlanta as the largest urban city administers the grant on behalf of the EMSA.

FY2020 – 2024 PRIORITIES, FUNDING, and CONSIDERATIONS

The City of Atlanta is the recipient of four (4) annual entitlement grants from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). These grants are: The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Home Investment Partnership program (HOME); and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program.

Award Expenditure Standards

The Consolidated Plan grant programs all have expenditure deadlines and/or performance standards mandated by HUD. Nationally, Congress and HUD have increasingly emphasized expenditure requirements and timely expenditures. Expenditure standards for these grants are as follows, and if not met, will be subject to recapture:

- CDBG unexpended funds in excess of 1.5 times its annual allocation at the end of the program period.
- ESG funds of the annual allocation must be expended within two years.
- HOME funds must be committed (under executed contract) within two years and expended within five years of the allocation.
- HOPWA funds must be spent three years after the annual allocation.

The City of Atlanta has assured HUD that the use and timeliness of funds as a significant factor in the selection of projects recommended and funded under these programs. It is critical that funding be awarded to programs and activities that will help meet the expenditure deadlines.

Program and Administrative Caps by Award

The Consolidated Plan grant programs also have other considerations which include program and administrative and/or other caps which are as follows:

- CDBG public services cap is a service category that is allowed only 15% of the total allocation. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan CDBG public services funding of \$1,049,513 is recommended.
- CDBG administration cap is mandated at 20% of the annual allocation plus program income which is recommended for planning and administration of the grant. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan CDBG administration funding of \$1,431,268 is recommended.
- ESG administration cap is mandated at 7.5% of the annual allocation which is recommended for planning and administration of the grant. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan ESG administration funding of \$47,050 is recommended.
- HOME administration cap is mandated at 10% plus 10% of program income which is recommended for planning and administration of the grant. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan HOME administration funding of \$361,314 is recommended.
- A minimum of 15% of the HOME grant must be allocated to support housing efforts undertaken by Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO). For the 2020 Annual Action Plan HOME-CHDO et-aside funding of \$541,970 is recommended. In addition, 5% of the HOME grant may be allocated for CHDO Operating Support. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan HOME CHDO Operating Support funding of \$180,657 is recommended.

- HOPWA administration cap is mandated at 3% for the grantee. For the 2020 Annual Action Plan HOPWA administration funding of \$683,863 is recommended.

APPENDICES

Community Engagement Overview

A grantee must develop and follow a detailed plan that provides for and encourages citizen participation. This integral process emphasizes participation by persons of low or moderate income, particularly residents of predominantly low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, slum or blighted areas, and areas in which the grantee proposes to use CDBG funds. The plan must provide citizens with the following: reasonable and timely access to local meetings; an opportunity to review proposed activities and program performance; provide for timely written answers to written complaints and grievances; and identify how the needs of non-English speaking residents will be met in the case of public hearings where a significant number of non-English speaking residents can be reasonably expected to participate.

Request for input and feedback from the citizens of Atlanta and surrounding service areas into the Consolidated Plan/Annual Action Plan process began with legal notices advertised on February 11, 2018 in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution and the Mundo Hispanico newspapers, informing the public regarding the 2020 Technical Assistance session. On Monday, April 22, 2019 Technical assistance was provided to potential applicants until the proposal application deadline of May 31, 2019. There were 117 proposals submitted requesting approximately \$XX million. Notice of the public hearing on the funding recommendations and Proposed Annual Action Plan will be published in the Atlanta Journal Constitution and Hispanico Mundo beginning the week of March 16, 2020 and posting for community stakeholders, contributors, and NPU's. The publication of the public comment period will end on April 20, 2020. The public hearing is scheduled to be held on April 20, 2020, at Atlanta City Hall in the Council's Chambers where all comments will be obtained, reviewed and accepted.

Proposal Evaluation Process Overview

As a commitment to transparency, all aspects of submitted applications are subject to public review, except for an agency's Board of Directors' home/office addresses and financial audit information. Proposals for new site-specific activities and proposals for new activities serving up to five NPU's (Neighborhood Planning Units) are available to be shared with the areas affected. Citywide proposals or proposals benefitting the Community Development Impact Area (CDIA) are shared with the Atlanta Planning Advisory Board. Prospective applicants may be asked to appear at one or more monthly NPU meetings. Applicants failure to meet with the NPU could result in a negative recommendation that could be factored into the overall ranking of the project. At the request of an NPU, the Office of Planning has the option to request/schedule a Citywide or continuing applicant to appear before an NPU though none was requested during the evaluation period.

The Office of Housing reviewed and evaluated all housing proposals requesting HOME funds. The Office of Housing provided rankings, funding recommendations and summaries as shown in the HOME housing chart.

ALL CDBG, ESG, HOME and HOPWA program proposals were evaluated by participating departments, the Office of Human Services and Office of Grants Management staff using the proposal scoring form, which contains evaluative criteria embedded in the policies and priorities of the 2020-2024 Consolidate Plan and Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP), including sound fiscal and program management principles. The proposal scoring form is updated as needed to meet federal regulation changes as well as the City's priorities.

HUD Entitlement Grants Overview

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG): provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons. Over a 1, 2, or 3-year period, as selected by the grantee, not less than 70 percent of CDBG funds must be used for activities that benefit low- and moderate-income persons. In addition, each activity must meet one of the following national objectives for the program: benefit low- and moderate-income persons, prevention or elimination of slums or blight, or address community development needs having an urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community for which other funding is not available.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG): provides annual grants funds based on the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) formula. It is designed to assist homeless individuals and families, and subpopulations within this group, such as victims of domestic violence, youth, people with mental illness, families with children and veterans. Emergency Shelter Grants Program funds can also be used to aid people who are at imminent risk of becoming homeless. Local governments must spend ESG grant award funds within a 24-month period. Local government grantees must also match grant funds with an equal amount of funds from cash or the following in-kind sources: new staff or volunteer time, the donation of materials and buildings, or the value of any lease on a building.

Home Investment Partnership (HOME): provides formula grants to States and localities that communities use - often in partnership with local nonprofit groups- to fund a wide range of activities including building, buying, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership or providing direct rental assistance to low-income people. HOME is the largest Federal block grant to state and local governments designed exclusively to create affordable housing for low-income households. HOME funds are awarded annually as formula grants to participating jurisdictions (PJs). The program's flexibility allows States and local governments to use HOME funds for grants, direct loans, loan guarantees or other forms of credit enhancements, or rental assistance or security deposits.

Housing Opportunities for Person with AIDS (HOPWA): is the only Federal program dedicated to the housing needs of people living with HIV/AIDS. Under the HOPWA Program, HUD makes grants to local communities, States, and nonprofit organizations to benefit low- income persons living with HIV and their households establish or maintain affordable and stable housing, reduce their risk of homelessness, and improve their access to health care and supportive services.
